A ratio is a comparison of two quantities. It can be written in three different ways: When both values in a ratio are multiplied or divided by the same, nonzero number, we have equivalent ratios. The 2:6 is equal to the ratio 1:3 because both numbers in the first ratio were divided by 2.

6:30, 6 to 30 or 6/30

d. What other ratios can we use to represent this relationship?

e. All of the sixth grade class is going on a field trip. There must be a 4:1 ratio of students to adults. If there are 600 sixth grade students, use equivalent ratios to help determine how many adults must also attend the field trip.

4 students to 1 adult 4 x ? = 600 4 x 150 = 600 4:1 = 4(150) : 1(150) = 600: 150

There must be 150 adults when 600 students attend the field trip.
